Proposed Annual Rate Increase from South San Francisco Scavenger Company,

<u>Purpose:</u> To review Notice of Intent and to implement the triennial formula rate increase for solid waste collection as provided for in the Franchise Agreement between the City of Brisbane and the South San Francisco Scavenger Company, Inc. (SSF Scavenger)

Recommendation: Approve rate increase for solid waste services effective July 1, 2012

Background: The City of Brisbane currently holds a franchise agreement with SSF Scavenger. This agreement was approved effective March 1, 1999. Services under this agreement not only include weekly residential and commercial solid waste removal services, but also provides for other services such as the annual citywide yard waste clean-up, management of annual diversion reports to CalRecycle, assistance in implementing new mandates such as the AB341 mandatory commercial recycling law, and other recycling services. The City's current franchise agreement with SSF Scavenger will end on February 28, 2014. Per section 3.1 of the current agreement, the City has the option of extending the agreement for a period of ten (10) years by notifying SSF Scavenger in writing no later than July 31, 2013.

Per State Assembly Bill 939, the City is required to have a diversion rate of 50%, meaning that discarded material needs to be sorted so that reusable and/or recycling material can be diverted from the waste stream. In 2009, SSF Scavengers services allowed the city to reach a diversion rate of 72%. In 2010, the diversion rate increased to 79%.

The Franchise Agreement with the SSF Scavenger provides for annual adjustment of rates for commercial and residential customers in Brisbane. There are two formulas for adjusting the rates.

1. Section 6.2 of the Agreement provides for an adjustment of 80% of the change in the CPI for the previous year. That is, if the CPI had increased during the previous year by 3%, the rates would increase by 2.4%.

2. Section 6.4 of the Agreement provides that every third year, a survey is to be done of a "basket" of 32 Bay Area cities which are listed in the Franchise Agreement. 2012 is a "survey" year. Brisbane's rates are to be set at 90.25% of the average of the rates in the 32 cities for each of the five benchmark categories, which are; 32 gallon residential container, 32 gallon commercial container, 2 yard commercial container (per month, weekly pick up), 14 yard debris box and Compacted Garbage Rate (per cubic yard). The SSF Scavenger's other rates are extrapolated from the benchmark rates. For example, the 20 gallon residential rate is set at 20/32 of the 32 gallon benchmark rate.

The agreement provides that SSF Scavenger submit the rate increase request by March 31st and the City act on the requests by July 1st of each year. The franchise agreement provides the City with limited authority to negotiate the increment between the formula increase and the alternative increase.

Discussion: On March 29, 2012, SSF Scavenger submitted the attached Notice of Intent to adjust the current rates for the City of Brisbane based on a survey of 32 cities, per Section 6.4 of the franchise agreement. Provided in the notice are the results from the 2012 survey prepared by BEG Consulting.

On April 24, 2012 the Subcommittee met with representatives of SSF Scavengers and discussed the proposed increases. Based on the discussion, the Subcommittee requested that Scavengers revise the proposal so that the increases would be equal between the residential and commercial can rates. On May 15, 2012, staff submitted their review of the survey for accuracy of the data and calculations. Based on the review and the subcommittee's request, the SSF Scavengers made a few revisions to the report and submitted the following proposed increases:

Rate	Proposed 2012 Increase	Proposed 2012 Rate

2-Yard Bin	6.71%	\$232.54 per month
Debris Box	8.62%	\$432.88 (14 yard, one time use)
Compacted Yard	3.83%	\$47.42 (per cubic yard per pick up)

The Subcommittee agreed that this proposal was in line with what is permitted by the franchise agreement and agreed to recommend approval of the attached proposed rate increase package to the City Council. The agreement provides that the City act on the rate increase notice of intent by June 30. Representatives of the SSF Scavenger will attend the Council meeting to answer any questions and to provide additional information on their operations to the Council and the public.

Fiscal Impact:

Based on these rates, the increase for a standard 32-gallon residential can would be \$1.22 per month, or an additional \$14.64 for the year for solid waste removal service. The increase for a 2-yard bin would be \$14.62 per month, or \$175.44 per year. The City currently receives a franchise

fee equal to 2% of the gross revenues derived from customers in Brisbane, which was \$31,698.10 for FY 10/11.

Measure of Success:

Is solid waste removal able to continue efficiently for the community?

The 20cy compactor rate assumes 7.5 tons.
