## Congratulations to Nancy Colman, 2018 Volunteer of the Year!

Each year, the City recognizes a Brisbane resident as its “Volunteer of the Year”, who the ad hoc City Council subcommittee selects after carefully reviewing letters of recommendation from other community members. The Volunteer of the Year award is bestowed upon a dedicated community member that has demonstrated ongoing commitment to the City of Brisbane. They act with the purpose of community in mind and give selflessly to others.

Nancy Colman was awarded the City’s 2018 Volunteer of the Year award at last month’s Day in the Park by Mayor Clarke Conway.

Over the past few years, Nancy has worked tirelessly to design an organization that has become a perfect fit for the Brisbane community. She facilitated community forums, attended meetings of similar organizations in neighboring

communities, networked, and formed a governing board for the organization. Without her vision, perseverance, and dedication, Brisbane Village Helping Hands would not exist today.

# G3: Guerilla Gardening Gangstas



If you haven't seen them in action on Visitacion, (remember – they've got the word "Guerilla" in their name), you've seen the fruits of their labor all along the four blocks of Brisbane's downtown drag, Visitacion Ave. We recently sat down with G3 at the Plug Preserve outside Julie's Deli. G3 was first featured in the STAR on the cover of the September 2017 issue which showed Sue Cochran applying a fresh coat of grey paint onto the fence outside Julie's. Joining us the other day were Sue and five of her fellow G3 members: Karen Cunningham, Danette Davis, Leesa Greenlee, Heidi Levison, and DeeDee Porter.

STAR: So, it's been a year, where you've celebrated your 1 year anniversary in that time, and have made some significant improvements to Visitacion!

DD: We've concentrated our efforts on Visitacion as this is the

hub of the city that the people who don't live in town interact with – this is what they see. We thought about what we could do to help the private owners of the businesses.

SC: Yes, just because someone owns a building or owns the business, doesn't mean they know how to make it more appealing, or improve the value of their property. Or, they just don't have time to think "outside the box". It's been easy to approach the owners and tell them about our idea to improve the flow of visitors into their business.

DD: We think about how the design will work, considering whether it's commercial vs. residential, what's adjacent to it, and how the design will impact the other buildings. I just sent the owner of Na Na's Kitchen a sample of the paint color we're considering, and she just approved it. Renee Marmion thought of using silk flowers for the Brisbane Inn and Eagles

Hall as a way to add color and plants in areas that are too hard to water. She even will change out the flowers according to the seasons.

STAR: It sounds like you all have your strengths that are put to use.

SC: Yes, we all have our specialties. I try to coordinate with all the different groups. For instance, I know who “the planters” are.

LG: Yes, and I think some of the most important work they do is maintaining.

DD: And when I couldn’t water the old video store, Lynda Montiel stepped in to help on my behalf. Now that I can do the watering again, she said she wanted to continue to do so with her grandkids because she gets to talk to people and hear their feedback. So we have “auxiliary” G3 members who are just happy to be a part of it by helping water and they’re good to go.

SC: And, most important, one of the things people do is donate money. It’s amazing how many people will see us and say, “Oh my gosh, thank you.” It’s the best return for your dollar. Give us something and we can do something with it immediately. Would you guys agree?

G3: YES.

KC: And we use our gardens to propagate a lot of the new plants, even those that are at Brisbane Elementary. We have the “nurseries”. (Laughter)

DP: They’re sort of “living on”.

HL: Yes, the cuttings came from our personal houses.

DD: I think we’re good stewards of the money people have donated and we really try to get the best value that we can.

STAR: It seems like the Community has really trusted G3’s vision, and know that you’re going to execute on it.

KC: The appreciation is huge.

HL: And it’s funny, because when I’m taking care of my little areas, people just walk by and say how much they love walking by this area and how it looks great. It makes you feel good.

SC: One of the terms we use is, “Gangsta”. That means, we do something, but we can’t always tell you...

HL: We might sneak in and do a little something, something.

DD: And most of the time, people don’t realize what was there before, they just know it looks better.

SC: I would have to say, this is fun, doing something with your friends that feels good.

LG: And helping people out, some of whom would really like to do something, but they’re not able to and they just need a little help – we’re happy to help. And the feeling is mutual – when I painted the mural, Julie’s kept bringing us out food and water.

And, we can see why. G3 puts their heads together and gives each project their full thought and attention.

Look for G3’s next projects, which include re-painting Na Na’s Kitchen, adding a hedge on the other side of the church, and of course, maintaining the many projects they’ve done to spruce up the downtown. Hats off to all the G3 members, auxiliary members, and those that have donated to the cause!

# VOTE in the November 6<sup>th</sup> General Statewide Election

By the time you're reading this, November 6th may be just a couple days away. We hope you exercise your privilege to vote. Brisbane City Hall (50 Park Place) will actually be one of the Vote Centers in the County that will be open November 3-5, three days prior to Election Day. Its hours BEFORE Election Day will be 9am - 6pm and 7am - 8pm ON Election Day.

The November 6, 2018 Statewide General Election is an all-mailed ballot election for the County. Every eligible voter will be mailed a ballot and can vote by mail or cast their ballot in person at a Vote Center during the times and days specified above. You may also register to vote at a Vote Center if you missed the Oct. 22nd deadline. November 3, 2018	Between these dates, for a minimum of eight hours per day (7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Election Day), at least one Vote Center is provided for every 10,000 registered voters within the jurisdiction where the election is held, as determined on August 10, 2018. Any voter registered in the county may visit any Vote Center in order to receive voter services or vote. EC §4005(a)(2)(A), (a)(3)(A)
November 6, 2018	Election Day. All Vote Centers open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Semifinal official canvass commences upon the closing of all polls at 8 p.m. EC §§1000, 4005, 14212, 15150, 15151
November 9, 2018	Vote by Mail ballots postmarked on or before Election Day must be received by County Elections Officials by this day in order to be counted. EC §3020
December 6, 2018	Last day for County Elections Official to certify election results to the jurisdictions participating in the election. EC §15372

# Annual Winter Clean-Up

November 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup>

The Annual Winter Clean-Up is scheduled for the weekend of November 17th and 18th. This is the time to clear your property of fallen leaves and branches which could find their way into one of the City's storm drains and cause flooding during the rainy season. It's also a great time to maintain the trees on your property. Trees need regular pruning to maintain their health. See <https://www.arborday.org/trees/tips/keys-to-pruning.cfm>

Dumpsters will be placed throughout town for residents to dispose of their yard waste.

Please place your yard trimmings and branches (less than 4 inches in diameter and NOT within plastic garbage bags) into the nearest dumpster. A map of the dumpster locations will be posted on the City's website to help residents locate them easily.

If you need assistance, we will have limited staff available to transport your yard waste to one of the dumpsters. For assistance, please call (415) 508-2147 during the following times:

**Saturday, November 17: 10:00 AM – 3:00 PM**

**Sunday, November 18: 9:00 AM – 1:00 PM**

Please remember that this is for YARD WASTE ONLY (leaves, branches, grass). NO GARBAGE OR OTHER WASTE is to be disposed of in these dumpsters. Doing so will make the entire load unrecyclable.

Now is also a good time to remove organic debris from your rain gutters to prevent clogs and damage to your home.

As a reminder, do not attempt to trim tree branches that are touching or near PG&E power lines. Call PG&E if you have any questions or concerns at (800) 743-5000. If you have other questions regarding tree removal in general, see the Tree Removal Permit page on our website or call (415) 508-2120.

Thank you in advance for your willingness and cooperation in this City-wide effort. If we all pitch in to clean up our properties from yard trimmings and fallen leaves, we can prevent future problems from occurring in our storm drains.



## Open Seats on the Complete Streets Safety Committee (CSSC) & the Open Space and Ecology Committee (OSEC)

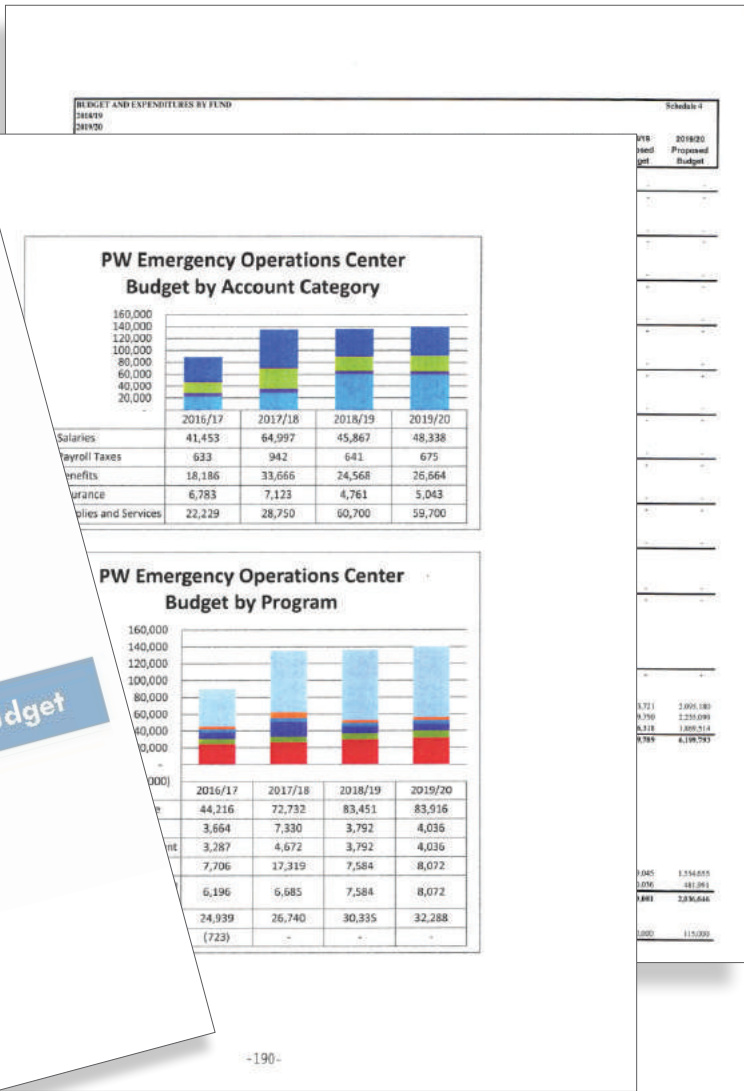
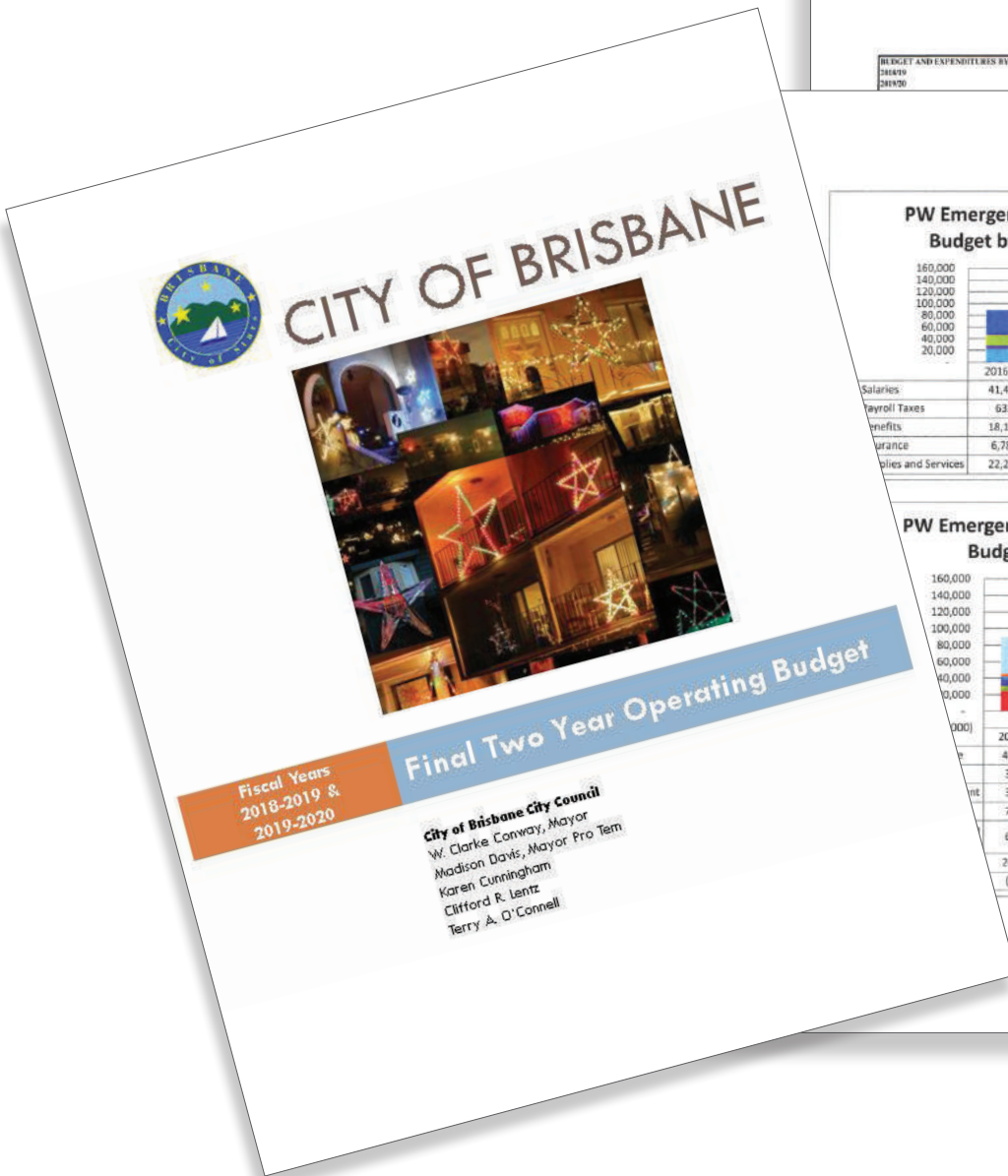

# Fire Service Day Recap at Station 81

## Reminder from NCFCA about Maintaining Address Numbers

Every year in October, which is also National Fire Prevention Month, the North County Fire Authority Fire Stations in Brisbane, Daly City, and Pacifica open their doors for the public to get a behind-the-scenes look at the firehouse, receive hands-on demonstrations of operating a fire hose, and of course climbing in and out of the fire engine! The antique fire engine, built in 1937, was of course also on display for photo ops. There were fire hats, safety brochures, and staff like the always-gracious Elizabeth Solis on-hand to answer questions attendees had, not to mention give away prizes determined by the prize wheel! The firefighters look forward to hosting the Community again next October! In the meantime, they want to remind residents to please maintain address numbers on your home. If the numbers on your home are not there or easy to find or read, it will take longer for emergency personnel to help you.

House numbers should meet the following requirements:

- Numbers need to be a minimum of 4 inches high and in a contrasting color to their background.
- Must be displayed on the front of the dwelling and visible from the street in both directions.

- Cannot be obstructed by shrubs, trees, decorations, etc. (take advantage of Winter Clean-Up this month on Nov. 17 & 18!)
- Fancy-shaped numbers or numbers that are spelled out should be avoided. These may be aesthetically-pleasing, but are difficult to quickly read from the street.
- If the dwelling is located more than 45 ft. from the front lot line, the number should be displayed on a gate post, fence, mailbox, or other appropriate place that will make it visible from the street in all directions.

Please take a moment to look at your house numbers. Make sure your numbers follow the above guidelines, as it will help emergency crews find you easier and faster.

Lastly, since the City *does not* maintain address numbers, it is highly unlikely we will contract with a company to do curb-painting of addresses. Please don't be fooled by any brochures you may receive in the mail announcing this City-provided service. 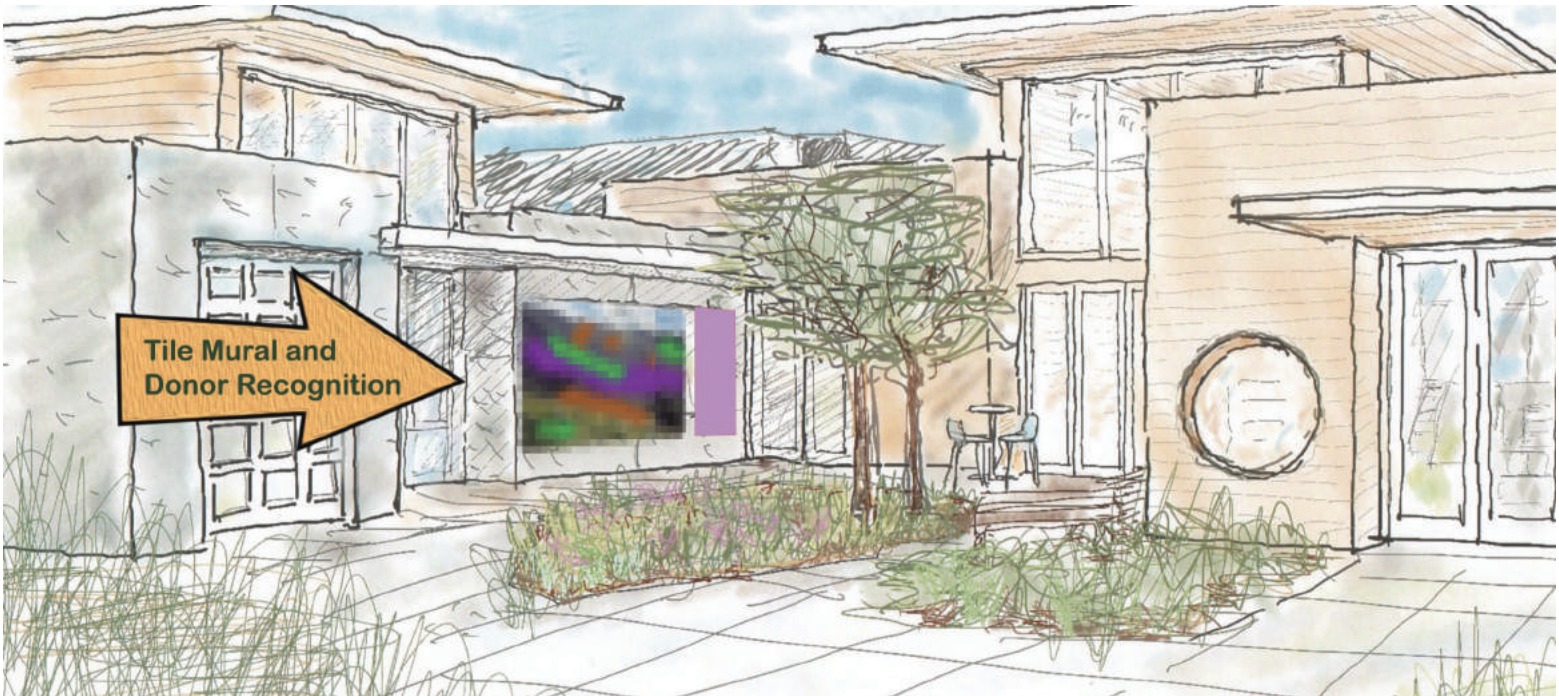

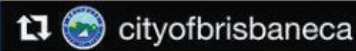

## Text to 9-1-1

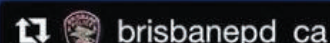
### Announcing all agencies in San Mateo County now accepting Text to 9-1-1

You can now text to 9-1-1 in an emergency. While we always want you to call 9-1-1, in those instances when you're unable to call, you can send a text to the 9-1-1 center. This new service allows people who are unable to speak to reach 9-1-1 and request emergency services. This might include those who are deaf or hard of hearing, unable to speak, or in a situation where it's unsafe to speak. To text to 911, enter the numbers "911" in the "To" or "Recipient" field. The text should be short, include the location of the emergency, and ask for police, fire or ambulance. Answer questions and follow instructions from the 9-1-1 call-taker. The location information accompanying a Text-to-9-1-1 call is not equal to wireless voice call location technology.

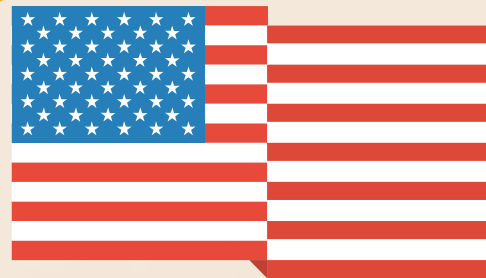

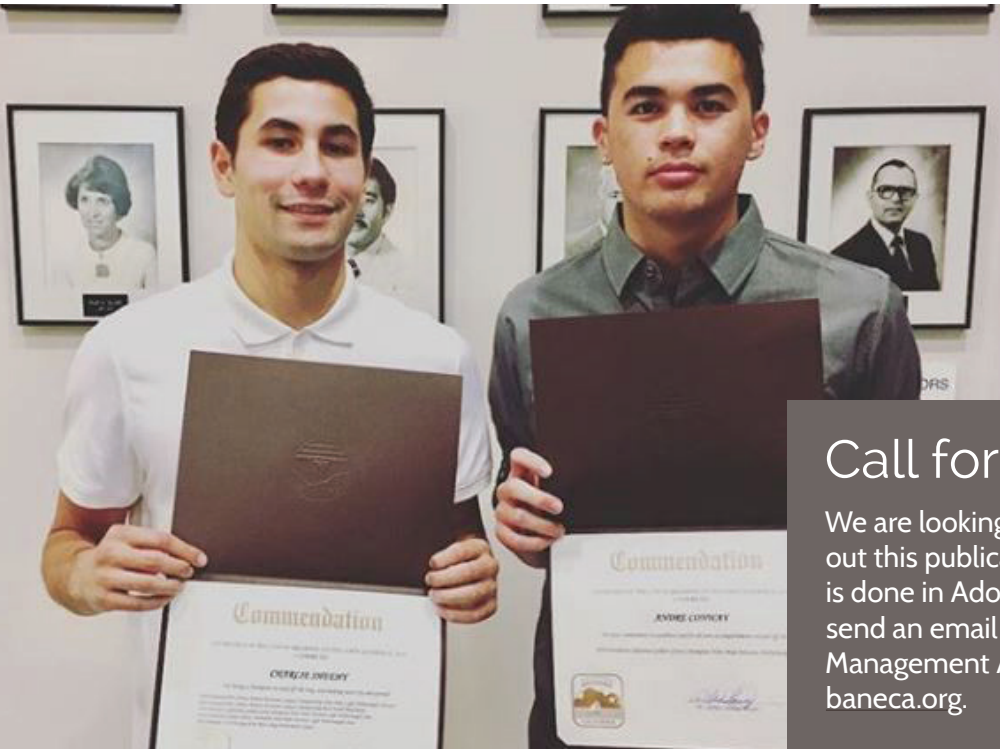
