



October 10th San Bruno Mountain/Kings Fire



Thankfully, the wind conditions were extremely mild at no more than 10 mph on Thursday, October 10th when a fire broke out on San Bruno Mountain at 10:50am. Named the "Kings Fire" by the Incident Commander, it burned 11 acres (about 8 football fields) and whose forward progress up the mountain was stopped within 30 minutes due to the firefighters that came from as far as Santa Cruz County Fire Dept. to help fight the grassfire, in addition to crews from North County Fire Authority, with Station 81 first on scene. They all worked together extremely quickly to form two firebreaks which prevented the fire from spreading.

The request for a voluntary evacuation for upper streets was lifted by 1pm, with all roadways open by 2:30pm. Two engines remained on-site last night to patrol the area. There were no injuries to firefighters and no structures were affected from the fire. The cause of the fire is still under investigation by CAL FIRE.

The North County Fire Authority reminds all residents to maintain clearance of vegetation a minimum of 30 feet away from homes and in order to be prepared for wildfire, go to the North County Fire Authority website at www.northcountyfire.org and see the Ready-Set-Go information provided.

Please get yourself signed up for SMCAalert if you haven't already done so: www.smcalert.info. The City used this alerting system during the fire as well as social media to send a series of alerts in order to keep the community informed. You may register up to five addresses in SMCAalert such as your home, work, child's school, or a relative's residence. You may also register by texting the zip code (i.e. "94005") to 888-777.

The nonprofit organization recently completed its 500th service request to assist Brisbane seniors, proving that its volunteers are truly making a big difference in this small community.

Members, volunteers and others interested in learning more about BVHH celebrated this milestone at BVHH's Fall Fiesta, held on September 14th in the Sunrise Room. Along with fun, food and beverages, entertainment was provided by members of Brisbane Dance Workshop's Adult Voice Class.

Launched in March 2016, BVHH's mission is to promote aging in place by providing volunteer services to seniors including transportation, minor home repairs, companionship, help with technology and social interaction through events such as the Fall Fiesta. It now includes 58 members (residents 55 and older who pay just \$20 per year) and 59 volunteers.

Among those enjoying the festivities was Frances Harrison, a BVHH member who just happened to have the 500th request filled by volunteer Paul Bouscal, who brightened her home by replacing hard-to-reach light bulbs in her kitchen and bathroom. In subsequent visits, he fixed her shower curtain, which kept falling down, and replaced her smoke and carbon monoxide alarms.

"I'd been walking around my house in the dark, and now I have both light and safety," says Harrison. "The Village is the best thing to happen to Brisbane with exception of the Marina and the park. It's an absolute godsend. Other people feel the same way too. I am very, very happy to have been given such help. And I enjoyed the social at the Sunrise Room very much."

BVHH is an excellent way to give back to your community – and receive assistance from local, caring, trusted volunteers who have undergone a background check. Volunteers may accept assignments that fit in with their schedule and interests. Many of those involved in BVHH – which is supported by the City and Lions Club – are members and volunteers.

Peninsula Clean Energy is again offering a popular electric vehicle (EV) discount program that saves thousands of dollars for San Mateo County residents through a partnership with seven participating local auto dealers. Sunterra Solar Completes High-Efficiency Sunpower System For City Of Brisbane Atop City Hall



Sunterra Solar recently announced the completion and successful operation of a 168-kilowatt (kW) solar energy system for the City of Brisbane. The SunPower rooftop PV system was installed on Brisbane's City Hall as part of the City's comprehensive sustainability and energy efficiency program.

In its first six months of operation, the City's solar energy system has outperformed expected estimates, producing 166,900 kilowatt hours (kWh) of clean power to date. On an annual basis, the system is expected to offset nearly all of the electricity used by the City's administrative offices. According to estimates provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the system will displace approximately 9 million pounds of carbon dioxide (CO₂) over the next 20 years – the equivalent CO₂ emissions from nearly 10 million miles driven by an average passenger vehicle.

The City sought bidders for its solar project through a competitive process that took a novel approach, asking bidders not just to provide pricing but to estimate annual system production and degradation rates over a 20-year period. Sunterra was selected due to its ability to demonstrate higher performance of SunPower systems. SunPower Maxeon panels produce up to 55% more energy than conventional solar panels in the same roof space over 25 years. SunPower also has the industry's lowest degradation rates, a measure of a solar panel's reliability over time.

"Although we are a relatively small city of 4,700 people, we take sustainability very seriously," said Randy Breault, Director of Public Works, City of Brisbane. "Sunterra did a great job of understanding that our intent in the bid process was to maximize energy production, and they were awarded the project because they had the highest production-to-bid cost ratio. The team has been a pleasure to work with throughout the process."

"Brisbane is a great example of what local communities can do to advance sustainability and take action on climate change while also being fiscally responsible," said Chris Bunas, President/CEO of Sunterra Solar Inc.

Brisbane has demonstrated its commitment to sustainability by adopting a Climate Action Plan in 2015 and implementing several innovative strategies including rainwater catchment, solar thermal heating for the community pool, and a city-wide commercial building energy-efficiency program. For its efforts, Brisbane became the first city in California to win the Institute for Local Government's Gold-Level Beacon Award in 2015 as well as subsequent Platinum Spotlight Awards for its holistic approach to addressing climate change.

A Note From Brisbane PD

Fentanyl Epidemic



What is Fentanyl? It is a synthetic opioid which is 50-100 times stronger than morphine. It was originally developed for cancer patients to assist them with pain management but is now vastly abused causing numerous overdoses in the United States.

Fentanyl related harm, overdose and deaths in the U.S. are mostly linked to illegally produced fentanyl which is sold on the illegal drug market. Fentanyl is purchased illegally due to its heroin-like effects. It has been mixed with heroin and/or cocaine with/without the knowledge of the user causing an increased euphoric effect.

Overdose deaths involving synthetic opioids including fentanyl has increased nearly 46% from 2016 to 2017, according to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. In 2017, the Drug Enforcement Administration issued a national alert stating that “drug incidents and overdoses related to fentanyl are occurring at an alarming rate.”

Common signs and symptoms of someone using fentanyl are; intense but short term high, euphoria feelings, slow respiration/reduced blood pressure, nausea, fainting, seizures and/or death.

If you believe that someone is overdosing on fentanyl please dial 9-1-1 as fire, medics and police are all equipped with naloxone (opioid antagonist) to counter the effects of opioid overdose.

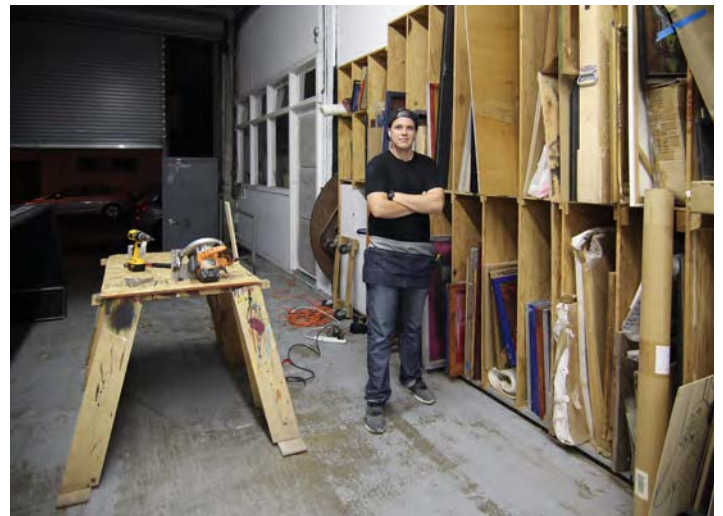

Selection of Artist for Skatepark Quarter Pipe Wall

At their Oct. 3rd meeting, the City Council directed staff to sign a contract with the firm Science and Company to paint a mural on the quarter pipe wall at the Skatepark, which will be seen along Old County Rd. The Public Art Selection Committee reviewed eight proposals before selecting Gaelen Smith as the artist. Of great importance to the Committee was for the artist to get a better understanding of what is important to the community so that the artwork would be reflective of the town.

To that end, Gaelen will be making 5-7 trips to Brisbane from San Francisco to speak with community members at the Skatepark as well as in the Community Park prior to submitting his proposed concept plan to the Committee. From there, it will go to the Parks and Recreation Commission and then to the City Council, who would have final approval before it's painted on the wall.

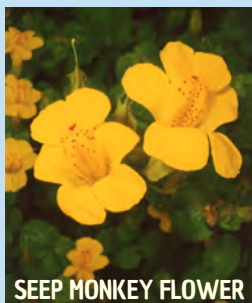
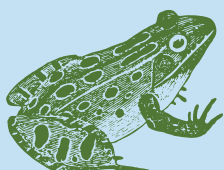
